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# Using zoom for lectures and seminars

Under the given circumstances of having to conduct an almost completely digital summer term in the course of the Corona pandemic, video conferencing tools are required in order to implement live sessions. Especially in order to be able to cover many parallel sessions and events with a lot of participants, the University of Freiburg has decided to license the commercial video conferencing solution "Zoom". Zoom offers the possibility of delivering lectures and seminars online with up to 300 students in one session. This document describes a good practice for participating in online lectures and courses. Please read this guide completely, before you join a meeting.

Zoom can be used at the university of Freiburg for the implementation of courses if a reliable and trouble-free implementation cannot be guaranteed with an information and communication system operated by the university of Freiburg itself or DFNconf. Please note the guidelines for the use of ZOOM at the University of Freiburg, as well as the information on data processing:

You do not need to install a client to participate in ZOOM meetings. You can also participate at any time via the browser and using a pseudonym that you have previously agreed upon with your Lecturer.

For small seminars or tutorials with up to 25 participants, lecturers can use the self-hosted server solutions "BigBlueButton (BBB)". BBB is connected to the learning platform ILIAS and can be accessed directly through your Course-Login without any further account.

At the University of Freiburg Zoom is used for 2 course-scenarios <sup>1</sup>during the corona crisis, to guarantee the most data-efficient way possible:

### Scenario A: Online lecture

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This scenario usually consists of a first part of a lecture given by lecturers. Here you can participate via text chat or poll if the lecturer allows it. Your audio or video feature should not be switched on in this part, alternatively they can be switched off by the instructor. If they choose so, lecturers can record this part. The recording will then only include their audio and slides, optionally the lecturer's camera. The recording should then be made available in ILIAS. In a second part, following the end of the recording, and usually in the round of questions, you can participate via activating your microphone and/or your camera. This depends on the sequence of events (determined by the lecturer).

### Scenario B: Online seminars

Online seminars via zoom must not be recorded for reasons of student data protection. Online seminars with zoom enable lecturers to use an online room shared with students in course-like teaching scenarios. In these online courses all participants can participate on a voluntary basis via audio and, if desired, also via video. Depending on the procedure (which is determined by the teacher) you have the possibility to show content from your own computer via screen sharing. On a whiteboard or via the commentary function on screen sharing everyone can annotate with simple drawing tools. For group work phases, a seminar can also be divided into so-called breakout rooms, which can be temporarily divided into small groups during the seminar. Lecturers are supported by moderation tools.

## **Comment on lecture recording:**

Please respect the personal rights of your instructors in this situation just as much as they must respect your personal rights. Instructors themselves decide whether they are willing to offer recordings with their audio and, if necessary, their video and make them available via ILIAS.

Students are not allowed to film / record during the live session (screenrecording) or respectively in the lecture hall; misdemeanor can be prosecuted.

# First steps

Lecturers will provide you a link to each meeting or lecture (e.g. for weekly sessions) with a meeting ID and a corresponding meeting password. Usually the lecturers provide this information in ILIAS or inform you by e-mail (see information on page 5).



### Participation via browser

With browsers, participation in zoom meetings or online lectures is also possible without having to install the zoom software. To do so, call up the link provided, assign a name or alias, and enter the room by entering the meeting password. We recommend the browser Chrome or Chromium (OpenSource), as this is where you will have the best experience with the use of camera and sound in the browser.

To participate with a mobile device (Android/iOS), the app must be installed.

# Optionally: Installing Client (Laptop/PC) or App

In order to be able to use <u>all functionalities</u> and participate in all interactive settings, you can also install the Zoom client. You can download it here:

Registration with Zoom is not necessary for you as a participant! Also in the client you only enter the meeting ID, an alias and the meeting password to join the session.

Please make sure that you always use the <u>latest version</u> of the Zoom client and update the client occasionally. A major security package has been announced for the end of May. After that only clients of version 5 and higher will work. # Participating in virtual classroom sessions and zoom meetings

### The link to the virtual classroom (meeting)

Lecturers usually provide access information via ILIAS in the form of a link (with a hashed password). For security reasons all zoom-meetings have a meeting ID and a meeting password. Therefore, access is only possible via the link (with passwordhash) or alternatively join a meeting in the zoom client with meeting-ID and password.

Alternatively, you can go to https://uni-freiburg.zoom.us and click on "Join" and then enter the meeting ID (number from the link) and the meeting password.

Do not pass on the link, meeting ID and meeting password to anyone else or post them on any public website or social media service. This information must be kept confidential. Violations may be porsecuted.

### Participation via browser

If you click on the link the website of Zoom opens.

If the Zoom client is installed, you will be asked if you want to open the room in it; otherwise you can also participate via the browser (see blue arrow and red marking).




Figure 1: Participation via browser is done via the link "join from your browser

**Attention Linux users**: When calling the meeting link under Linux, the browser very quickly switches to the download page of the client solutions. A download is not required for Linux users either. Be either quickly (use the link "join via the browser", or set up a bookmark <a href="https://uni-freiburg.zoom.us/">https://uni-freiburg.zoom.us/</a> and go directly to the Option "Join" and entering the meeting ID and meeting password.

## **Entering your name and ReCaptcha**




Figure 2: Opening a meeting, entering a name or alias

If you enter the meeting with the browser, you have to confirm a name and the ReCaptcha (fig. 2). Pay attention to your personal data. If you want to, participate with an alias of your choice and not with your clear name. Please arrange meeting rules with your lecturer so that he or she can assign you as an authorized participant.

### Using Zoom for the first time

The first time you use the client or your browser, you must agree to the Zoom Privacy Policy and Terms of Use (Fig. 3). If you entered via an incognito mode, you would need to provide this confirmation for each meeting.

### Arriving in the virtual meeting room




Figure 4: Indication that the meeting has not yet been started by the meeting host.

You have now clicked on the link and agreed to the terms of use and can enter the virtual classroom. Depending on your settings, you may have to wait a little longer because the meeting has not yet started. A meeting will only be started if th lecturer ("host") of the meeting has entered first. He/she must open the meeting (just like a lecture hall or seminar room). In this case it is indicated that the meeting has not started yet (fig. 4). Do not close the browser or app, but rather wait.

You will automatically enter the lecture or seminar room as soon as the instructor has started the session. If the instructor is already virtually present, a dialog will appear where you can enter the meeting password.




Figure 5: Entering the meeting password



By default, a waiting room is set up so that you are only allowed into the meeting room after the instructor has given their permission (Fig. 6). As soon as the instructor lets you in, you are in the lecture room/meeting.

# Possibilities of interaction during the course

Note: Functions marked with an asterisk \* are only available when using the Zoom application.

#### Activate own audio or video




Figure 7: Camera and microphone controls

If you want to be seen yourself, you can switch on your camera in the upper or lower control bar (Fig. 7). You can also switch on your microphone there if you want to contribute to the course.

Especially for large events or poor Internet connection, it is advisable not to switch on the video function so as not to interfere with transmission. The camera and microphone are deactivated if they are crossed out.

If the lecture part is being recorded and you do not agree with a recording of your picture or voice, please make sure by yourself that both your camera and microphone are switched off. An accidentally switched on image transmission is usually not recorded by the technical settings. However, sound transmission via microphone could be recorded. Instructors therefore usually disable the possibility of accidentally switching on the microphone during recording. Please help and make sure that both are and remain switched off during the recording.

The start of a recording is always indicated both acoustically and with a screen message for your approval. If you do not agree to participate in the part of the meeting to be recorded, despite the above-mentioned precautions which should prevent you from being recorded, you can leave the meeting at any time.

### Ask questions via chat

Open the chat via the balloon in the control panel. A chat window appears on the right side of the screen. This gives you the opportunity to ask questions. Especially for courses that are being recorded, it is important that you use the chat for questions if you do not explicitly agree with the recording of your voice. The chat history is not taken into account in the recording.

### Catching the speaker's eye

Often questions arise from the lecture content. You have the possibility to draw attention to your question by a show of hands. Also in interactive lectures, the virtual hand raising allows you to contribute something to the topic. If you participate via Browser, this function is available in Chrome/Chromium only.

## Use commenting function\*

Instructors can share presentations and teaching materials with you. If the commentary function (fig. 10) is activated by the instructor, you have the possibility to mark areas with a pencil or to type in text at the desired position by clicking on it. This allows to annotate PowerPoint slides together.

### Start and stop your own screen sharing




Figure 11: Control bar to activate screen sharing

Upon request by your supervisor you as a student can also share your own presentations or exercise sheets with everyone else in the course. To do so, you must first request permission from the instructor (host) (click on the green icon "Share Screen" (Fig. 11). With this permission you can select the "Share Screen" icon at the bottom of the control bar.

Please make sure that you have already opened the content you want to share and only release the window that is to be transmitted (e.g. PPT or a specific browser window). Searching takes time. You should also close private chats or email programs before you share them to avoid sharing them accidentally.



### Group work in breakout rooms

For partner or group work, the instructor can assign you to virtual group work rooms - so-called breakout rooms. The activities in breakout rooms cannot be recorded by meeting hosts.

During a group work phase, you have the possibility to request "help" from the instructor. They can then enter the group room at your request. They can also send a message to all groups, which will then appear as a "pop-up message".

As soon as the group work is completed signaled by the instructor or by time control, the group members have 60 seconds to say goodbye. Of course, you can also return to the main room of the virtual lecture hall by clicking on it.

### Participating in surveys

Instructors can run surveys during the session to get a picture of the mood of the participants, interrupt PPT lectures with a question or activate prior knowledge. A multiple-choice question will then appear on the participants' screens, which you can answer.

Note: This function does not work in all browsers. Use Chrome or the Zoom Client if you know that the lecturers are working with surveys in their sessions.

#### End of the lecture or seminar

After the time expires, the meeting host ends the online session. Participants are then automatically removed from the room. Please close the browser window or the program or the app.
